

A semi-colon can be used to separate two related main clauses which are of equal importance.



A main clause contains one idea or event, a verb and <u>always</u> makes sense on its own.



Semi-colons show the reader that there is a pause in the sentence that is longer than for a comma but shorter than for a full stop.



The film was amazing. We all had a great time!

The film was amazing; we all had a great time!

Top tip! Don't over-use semi-colons in your writing. Mix them up with conjunctions, e.g. and, so, but etc. and dashes in place of the pause.
