

A colon can be used to introduce examples or explanations The examples or explanations, which give more information, come after a main clause and a <u>colon</u>.



A main clause contains one idea or event, a verb and <u>alwavs</u> makes sense on its own.



Colons show the reader that there is a pause in the sentence that is longer than for a comma but shorter than for a full stop.



It was very cold. The temperature was below zero.

It was very cold: the temperature was below zero.

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You <u>CANNOT</u> introduce a new idea with a colon...

The trees had grown tall: the woods were a popular place to walk dogs.



Top tip! Don't over-use colons in your writing. Mix them up with conjunctions, e.g. because, as, for etc. and dashes in place of the pause.
